

Knives for cutting, plants to make dye, and raw bamboo.


Craftsmen are being inspired by traditional methods of producing these goods.

Since the old days, the indigo plant has been used not only for dyeing a variety of products, but also for medicinal purposes.

In Japanese daily life, indigo was an important and indispensable commodity .

However, due to the import of industrially manufactured indigo dyes, the production of local natural indigo in ancient Japan diminished. It became limited to select regions in the country. One of the precious indigoes that still exists today is the Awa Ai of Tokushima Prefecture.

It is said that the work that goes into the creation of the dye is extremely demanding. The hands of craftsmen who continue to dye the cloths over and over again have become blue and black, blending in with the indigo colours.

Each design crafted through the Craftsman's time, effort, and blue-dyed hands is unique. Feel Japan Blue, a fabric that is becoming more predominant in fashion.

These handmade umbrellas evoke images of historical Japanese dramas.



The umbrella is made by pasting Japanese paper onto a bamboo frame, and treating the assembly with oil. The combination of the oil fragrance and the sounds of raindrops falling on the umbrella create a pleasant and surreal atmosphere for your senses. Each umbrella is constructed with the utmost delicacy. Japanese paper is then affixed to the framework. When it takes shape, it is reinforced with glue or persimmon juice. Oil is added to waterproof it. The craftsmen finally decorate it with lacquer to add finishing touches.

Japanese umbrellas were popular until 1950. Around that time, production volume drastically decreased, and most of the traders were forced to go out of business. In recent times, volunteers have gathered to revive the production of old-fashioned umbrellas. To further the cause, creation is currently being done on handmade Japanese umbrellas. We do our part also by carrying out experience programs to spread knowledge about the umbrellas.

Bamboo is sharpened, bent with heat, and assembled. It just takes a few centimeters to a few millimeters of bamboo, and pieces come to life in the palms of the craftsman.

In particular, these dolls themed with *Awa Odori*, Tokushima's very own local dance, is a craft that can only be seen here.

Kimono, drum; each doll has its own individual features that make them one-of-a-kind. No doll looks like another, as the materials are cut simply in a way that makes good use of the original characteristics of the bamboo being utilised. When all the parts come together, these dancing dolls capture the eyes of the viewer. The characteristics change depending on the piece of bamboo used. The technique of producing them one by one by hand, is a display of true craftsmanship.









Soot black and earth toned in colour, this footwear is produced using select materials.

From cutting the wood materials to shaping their form, craftsmen work by hand from start to finish.

The blade is key in this process. In order to make these sandals, special blades made specifically for shaving materials or drilling holes are indispensable.

In addition, the colouring process goes beyond just painting. By burning it with a burner and polishing it with a rope, it renders a distinct beautiful black soot colour.

Geta were used as a fashion statement for Japanese hundreds of years ago. Even as the times have changed, the same sandals remain fashionable.

Originally, *geta* were meant to be paired with traditional clothing, but in keeping with the times, the sandals are also being fashioned to match with modern styles.
